CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT "SHALL PROPERTY TAXES BE LIMITED FOR ALL CLASSES OF PROPERTY by amending the Constitution of the State of Indiana to do the following: (1) Limit a taxpayer's annual property tax bill to the following percentages of gross assessed value: (A) 1% for an owner-occupied primary residence (homestead); (B) 2% for residential property, other than an owner-occupied primary residence, including apartments; (C) 2% for agricultural land; (D) 3% for other real property; and (E) 3% for personal property. The above percentages exclude any property taxes imposed after being approved by the voters in a referendum. 2010 GENERAL ELECTION REMINDERS AS YOU VOTE

We have the precious right to vote, and voting helps to keep our representative government strong and answerable to the people.

As you vote in the next several weeks, there are several things to keep in mind: that you can vote before November 2nd and that you must be able to present a valid photo identification document.

ABSENTEE VOTING

Voting in Person

You can vote in person, up to noon on Monday, November 1st, at the **Brown County Clerk's Office** (Old Courthouse): Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m.; Saturdays, October 23 and 30: 8 a.m.-3 p.m. **No reason or explanation is needed to vote absentee in person.**

Voting by Mail or Travel Board

If you need to vote by mail or use the Travel Board to cast your vote, you must fit into one of the following categories:

- Reasonable expectation of being absent on November 2nd.
- You have a disability.
- You are at least 65 years of age.
- You have official election duties the entire 12 hours polls are open.
- You are scheduled to work during the entire 12 hours the polls are open.
- You are confined due to injury or illness or caring for one who is sick.
- For religious reasons.
- You are participating in the Indiana address confidentiality program.
- You are a member of the military or a public safety officer.

If you meet one of these qualifications, you should immediately call the **Brown County Clerk's Office**: 988-5512. Information will be sent to you to assist you in voting.

PHOTO IDENTIFICATION REQUIRED

All voters must present a government-issued photo identification document which has a valid expiration date.

- Your ID must display your photo.
- Your name on the ID must conform to your voter registration record (but does not have to be identical).
- Your ID must contain an expiration date and either still be current or have expired sometime after the last General Election of November 4, 2008.
- Your ID must have been issued by the State of Indiana or the U.S. Government.
Examples of acceptable documents include: driver's license; passport; student ID issued by an Indiana state school and has an expiration date.

If any voter does not have an ID that meets these requirements, you can get one for **free** at any Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicle branch. Call the BMV for locations, times and requirements:

You must have an ID to vote at the polling place, to vote absentee in person or by Travel Board. No ID is required for voting absentee by mail.

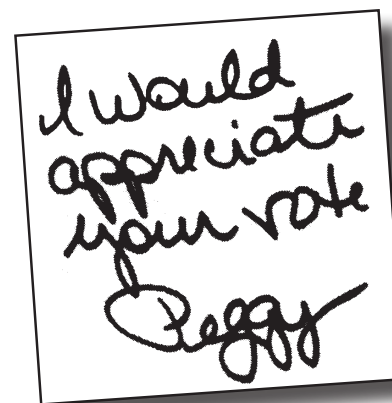
PROVISIONAL BALLOTS

If you are challenged at the polls before being allowed to cast your vote, ask for a Provisional Ballot. You will be allowed to vote on a new Provisional Ballot, but your ballot will be kept separate from the others and forwarded to the local County Election Board after the polls close to determine if your vote should be counted. Here are several reasons why voters may be challenged at the polls and allowed to vote provisionally:

- Unable to present an ID that meets the requirements above.
- Voter's name does not appear on the poll list.
- Name appears on the poll list, but the voter has moved.
- Voter's signature does not match that on the voter registration record.
